STRATEGIES FOR IMPROVING LAW ENFORCEMENT RESPONSES TO PEOPLE WITH BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CONDITIONS

In the course of their work as first responders, police officers routinely encounter people with mental and/or substance use disorders. However, many officers lack training in responding to mental health crises or options other than a hospital emergency department or the jail. This webinar will examine efforts to ensure successful interactions between police officers and people experiencing a mental health crisis, a mental health co-response strategy in Portland (ME), and the Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion initiative in King County (WA). MEETING THE NEEDS OF JUSTICE-INVOLVED WOMEN: SPECIALIZED COURT RESPONSES TO VICTIM-DEFENDANTS

Date: March 30, 2017 @ 3:00p.m. – 4:30p.m. ET

Research on justice system responses has shown that a one size-fits-all approach is not effective. For female defendants, it is especially critical that their needs are met in an individualized, gender-responsive way. Justice-involved women have complex histories of trauma and abuse that can be masked if courts aren't assessing them effectively. This can be complicated further when the line between victim and defendant blurs, particularly in cases involving intimate partner violence and human trafficking.

This webinar will discuss best practices for working with justice-involved women. It will highlight the work of the Queens Human Trafficking Intervention Court in New York, which has a Hidden Victims Project that identifies victims of human trafficking and links them to services.

TREATING VETERANS IN DWI COURT: A CONTINUUM OF EARNED SERVICES AS A RESULT OF SELFLESS SACRIFICE

Honor, courage, commitment, and sacrifice are words often used to describe the men and women who have served in our United States Armed Forces. Unfortunately, those words are scarcer when discussing those veterans who become involved in the justice system. But often, that involvement is a result of mental health, trauma, or substance use conditions that stem directly from their service.

There is an emerging trend across the country in which more and more veterans are enrolling in DWI court programs, but these men and women are not always aware of the range of services for which they qualify. This webinar will take a deeper look at the transition from active-duty service to veteran civilian status, substance use and addiction in the military veteran population, treating veteran-specific mental health needs, and the unique services available to veterans in your DWI court program through the Department of Veterans Affairs and other resources.

SAMHSA'S ASSISTED OUTPATIENT TREATMENT REGIONAL TRAININGS

Registration Deadline: March 24, 2017

Local stakeholders interested in initiating, expanding or improving the practice of assisted outpatient treatment (AOT) in their community or state are invited to register for SAMHSA-sponsored training on launching and operating an AOT program.

SAMHSA will present 2-day trainings at three different sites across the nation in May and June to address the common barriers that public mental health officials and judges have reported as reasons for not fully implementing AOT in their communities. The curriculum, developed by the Treatment Advocacy Center in consultation with SAMHSA, will be targeted to leaders and policymakers of state and local mental health agencies, judges who currently preside over civil commitment dockets, coordinators and providers of outpatient services to high-risk individuals with mental illness, and leaders of peer and/or family advocacy groups. Attendees will hear from and interact with their counterparts in jurisdictions that currently practice AOT, receive practical instruction on establishing and maintaining successful AOT programs, forge useful connections, exchange insights and observations, and develop concrete action plans.

Teams may include up to 5 people and should represent as broad an array of stakeholders as possible. The training will be free, but attendees must cover their own travel costs and make their own travel arrangements.

This opportunity is not available to current SAMHSA AOT grantees.

NEW STUDIES TO EVALUTE THE JUSTICE SYSTEM

Application Deadline: March 23, 2017

This Department of Justice supports research on safety, health, and wellness in the criminal justice system. Applicants can choose from three funding categories to study: 1. Behavioral, psychological and psychological measures related to mental and physical health. 2. The impact of the criminal justice system on families and child development 3. JUSTICE AND MENTAL HEALTH COLLABORATION PROGRAM FY 2017 Applications Deadline: April 4, 2017

The Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Program (JMHCP) supports innovative cross-system collaboration to improve responses and outcomes for individuals with mental illnesses or co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders who come into contact with the justice system. BJA is seeking applications that demonstrate a collaborative project between criminal justice and mental health partners from eligible applicants to plan and implement justice and mental health strategies collectively designed between justice and mental health. COMPREHENSIVE OPIOID ABUSE SITE-BASED PROGRAM FY 2017 Application Deadline: April 25, 2017

Signed into law on July 22, 2016, the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA) is the first major federal substance use disorder treatment and recovery legislation in 40 years and the most comprehensive effort to address the opioid epidemic. CARA establishes a comprehensive, coordinated, and balanced strategy through enhanced grant programs that expand prevention and education efforts while also promoting treatment and recovery. The Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Site-based program was developed as part of the CARA legislation. The purpose of the Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Site-based Program is to provide financial and technical assistance to states, units of local government, and Indian tribal governments to plan, develop, and implement comprehensive diversion and alternatives to incarceration programs that expand outreach, treatment, and recovery efforts to individuals impacted by the opioid epidemic who come into contact with justice system. A separate competitive Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Training and Technical Assistance (TTA) solicitation will be posted during the first quarter of FY 2017. The TTA program is designed to complement the site-based competitive solicitation. The Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Site-Based Grant Program (COAP) consists of six different grant program categories.

Dollar Amount: First subcategory of funding is up to \$100,00 for 24 months. The second

Subcategory of funding is up to \$750,000 for 24 months.

Category 5: Harold Rogers Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP) Implementation and

Enhancement Projects

Supports implementation and enhancement of PDMPs

Most of the work the Annie E. Casey Foundation supports takes the form of multi-year, multi-site, foundation-based projects. However, the foundation, which focuses on helping vulnerable and at-risk children, youth and their families, does not discourage interested organizations from submitting letter of inquiry when looking for grants. Founded in 1948, the primary mission of the Foundation is to foster public policies, human-service reforms, and community supports that more effectively meet the needs of vulnerable children and families. It is the 15th largest private foundation in the United States, with assets of more than \$3 billion, and ranks 20th in the nation for charitable giving.
