## Application Deadline: December 31, 2017

The NCJFCJ is excited to announce a unique opportunity to test the Juvenile Drug Treatment Court (JDTC) Guidelines (Guidelines), released in 2016 by the Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency and Prevention, in sites participating in the JDTC Learning Collaborative. This means that the selected sites will be evaluated by an independent research organization to determine if JDTCs and the Guidelines are effective. This new and exciting venture will include up to 12 JDTC teams willing and able to meet the intensive research requirements. The NCJFCJ will select six new sites through a call for applications process. These sites will receive:

- additional training on the JDTC Guidelines (travel assistance included);
- support and technical assistance to implement recommended practices; and
- financial support for additional research activities (up to \$25,000 for each site).

For courts participating in the study, the JDTC should have 35-40 youth enrolled over a two year period and access to data on 100-110 other youth served by an affiliated (non-JDTC) juvenile court (i.e., the larger juvenile justice system).
