

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section 1 caseload activities

The following tables provide a summary of 2009 caseload activity for the Court, including cases filed, final dispositions and cases pending on Dec. 31, 2009.



In 2009, Supreme Court of Ohio case filings decreased by 6 percent from 2008. The total number of cases filed in 2009 was 2,363, compared with 2,506 in 2008. This decline in case filings represents the first decline since 2006.

The Court disposed of 2,485 cases in 2009, down 2 percent from 2008 when 2,541 cases were disposed. The number of cases pending on Dec. 31, 2009 was 771, down from 893 cases pending at the end of 2008. The 2009 clearance rate was 105 percent, compared to 101 percent in 2008.

The percent of pro se filings ranged from a low of 31 percent in 2005 to a high of 41 percent in the past year. In 2009, 969 cases were filed by pro se litigants.


section 2 caseload 2005-2009

The following charts show the caseload activity of the Court, including total cases filed, total case dispositions, total cases pending, and appeals filed by pro se litigants for the years 2005 through 2009 for purposes of comparison.

Also included in this section is a chart reflecting the number and percent of jurisdictional appeals filed and accepted for review. These charts compare the years 2004 through 2008 because this data is measured by the year in which the appeal was filed. The most recent year for which the data is complete is 2008.


CASES FILED 2005-2009

In 2009, the Supreme Court of Ohio case filings declined by 6 percent from 2008. The total number of cases filed in 2009 was 2,363 compared with 2,506 filed in 2008. This decline in case filings represents the first decline since 2006.




CASE DISPOSITIONS 2005-2009

CASES PENDING 2005-2009



APPEALS BY PRO SE LITIGANTS 2005-2009

During the past year, the percent of pro se filings increased to 41 percent of the appeals filed. In 2009, 969 cases were filed by pro se litigants. This number represents a 5 percent increase over 2008, and is the largest number of pro se filings since we began tracking the data in 2004.



JURISDICTIONAL APPEALS FILED 2004-2008 AND ACCEPTED FOR MERIT REVIEW

The percent of jurisdictional appeals accepted in any given year is calculated for the year in which the appeal was filed and not the year in which the appeal is accepted. In 2008, the number of jurisdictional appeals filed was 2,004 and, of these, 147 appeals, or 7.3 percent, were accepted by the Court for full consideration on the merits. The number of jurisdictional appeals filed with the Court in 2009 was 1,817 and, as of Dec. 31, 2009, 513 jurisdictional appeals were pending the Court's consideration.

section 3 time to disposition 2005-2009


The following charts reflect the length of time from the origination of an action to final disposition in broad categories of case types, including all cases, jurisdictional appeals accepted for merit review, original actions, disciplinary cases, unauthorized practice of law cases, character and fitness cases and all cases decided with an opinion. The charts provide data for the years 2005 through 2009 for purposes of comparison.



ALL CASES

From Case Filing to Final Disposition

In 2009, the Court disposed of 2,485 cases. The mean* number of days a case was pending before the Court continued to decline for the third consecutive year, from a high of 158 days in 2006 to 131 days in 2009.

^{*}Mean and median are both measures of central tendency, a term that refers to the "middle" value of a set of data. Arithmetic mean is calculated by dividing the sum of a data set by the number of items in the set. Median is determined by sorting the data set from lowest to highest value and identifying the data point in the middle of the range. It is the midpoint of the data at which half the items are higher and half are lower. Median, unlike arithmetic mean, is not subject to the skewing effect of outliers; that is, data points at an extreme margin on the range of values.

JURISDICTIONAL APPEALS ACCEPTED FOR MERIT REVIEW

From Filing of Notice of Appeal to Final Disposition

The Court disposed of 128 jurisdictional appeals following a full merit review in 2009. From the date of initiation to the date of disposition, it took an average of 435 days for these cases to make their way through the Court.

Time for consideration increased by 32 days because three of the 128 jurisdictional appeals were pending for more than 800 days. Two of the three cases, *Stewart v. Lake Cty. Historical Soc., Inc.*, Case No. 2006-2029, and *Kirchner v. Shooters on the Water, Inc.*, Case No. 2006-1682, were pending for more than 1,000 days. The third case, *State v. Bankhead*, Case No. 2007-0818, was first held for *State v. Simpkins* and then later held for *State v. Mossmeyer*. All three cases were accepted in 2007 and held for the decision in another case before final disposition in 2009.





JURISDICTIONAL APPEALS NOT ACCEPTED FOR MERIT REVIEW

From Filing of Notice of Appeal to Final Disposition

The decision to accept a jurisdictional appeal was made more rapidly in 2009. The average time to consider acceptance decreased to 95 days from 101 days in 2008. Of the total number of cases disposed of by the Court in 2009, 1,796 cases were jurisdictional appeals not accepted for full consideration on the merits, a drop of 71 cases from 2008. The 1,796 jurisdictional appeals considered represented 76 percent of the cases filed in 2009.

ORIGINAL ACTIONS From Filing to Final Disposition

The median reveals that original actions during 2009 were disposed of in 61 days. The average number of days for original action consideration over the past five years is much higher, varying from 73 to 85 days. In 2009, the average number of days to consider and dispose of an original action was 74 days, the same number of days taken in 2008. In general, the median measurement is more reflective of the Court's timelines with regard to original actions because it is not subject to the skewing effect of outliers.





DISCIPLINARY CASES ON REPORT OF BOARD From Filing of Board Report to Final Disposition

The length of time to dispose of disciplinary cases dropped significantly in 2009 to 164 days, down from 182 days in 2008. The number of cases considered increased by 11 cases to a total of 81 cases considered in 2009.

The average time to disposition in UPL cases decreased in 2009 to 177 days, yet the number of cases rose from two in 2008 to 10 in 2009.





From Filing of Board Report to Final Disposition

The average number of days pending before the Court increased in 2009 to 157 days from a low of 128 days during 2008.

CASES DECIDED WITH AN OPINION

From Submission to Court until Issuance of Opinion

The number of cases decided with an opinion increased by six cases, while the time to decision decreased by nine days, from 104 days in 2008 to 95 days in 2009. The case numbers do not include cases held for decisions in other cases.



section 4 briefing to oral argument 2005-2009

The following charts show the time from the completion of briefing on a matter until oral argument is held. The time measured includes the six-week advance notice provided to parties scheduled to participate in oral argument. Charts are provided on:

- all cases argued
- accepted appeals, certified conflicts and certified questions of state law
- practice of law cases (including disciplinary cases, bar admission cases, and unauthorized practice of law cases)
- master commissioner cases
- jurisdictional appeals.

ALL CASES ARGUED

From Completion of Briefing to Oral Argument

In 2009, the average number of days from completion of briefing until oral argument decreased by 21 days. The number of cases orally argued decreased from 185 cases in 2008 to 157 cases.





ACCEPTED APPEALS, CERTIFIED CONFLICTS AND CERTIFIED QUESTIONS OF STATE LAW

The chart shows that the average number of days taken to schedule cases decreased by 14 days. In addition, the number of cases decreased to 122 in 2009, from 138 in 2008.

The average time from briefing to oral argument was reduced by three days and the median dropped by eight days. The number of practice of law related cases increased by three.





MASTER COMMISSIONER CASES SCHEDULED FOR ORAL ARGUMENT

The average number of days from completion of briefing to oral argument for master commissioner cases increased from 172 to 209 days. Three death penalty cases skewed the average by taking more than 400 days from completion of briefing to oral argument. The median number of days in 2009 was 120 days down from 152 in 2008. The number of cases scheduled in 2009 dropped to 15 cases, down from 30 in 2008.

JURISDICTIONAL APPEALS

From Date Filed until Case is Ready for Conference Scheduling

The number of days until a case is ready for conference scheduling is calculated by totaling the number of days from the date a notice of appeal is filed until the date that either a waiver or memorandum in response is filed. In 2009, the average number of days remained the same as in the prior year.



NOTES

- The 2008 annual report lists the total pending cases on Dec. 31, 2008, as 892. The total should have been 893 cases, as Case No. 2008-1942 mistakenly was not included in the count of pending cases.
- 2. This category includes cases in which the appellant sought jurisdiction as both a discretionary appeal and a claimed appeal of right. A discretionary appeal is an appeal that involves a felony or a question of public or great general interest and invokes the discretionary jurisdiction of the Supreme Court. A claimed appeal of right is an appeal that claims a substantial constitutional question, including an appeal from a decision of a court of appeals under App. R. 26(B) in a noncapital case.
- 3. One death penalty case was filed in 2009. It was an appeal from the courts of common pleas in which the death penalty was imposed for an offense committed on or after Jan. 1, 1995.
- 4. See p. 29 for details of cases relating to the practice of law filed in 2009.
- 5. This category includes cases in which the Court declined jurisdiction, denied leave to appeal or dismissed the appeal.
- 6. See note 2.
- 7. Included in this category are three cases involving appeals from the courts of common pleas in which the death penalty was impose for an offense committed on or after Jan. 1, 1995.
