

Criminal Sentencing Commission Summer and Fall 2025 Legal Externship Opportunity

The Ohio Criminal Sentencing Commission has an unpaid externship opportunity for the Summer and Fall 2025 semesters. Only candidates seeking academic credit will be considered for this opportunity. Candidates should have completed their first year of law school.

The Ohio Criminal Sentencing Commission is statutorily created within the Supreme Court of Ohio as per Ohio Revised Code Section 181.21. The statutes that guide the work of the commission are R.C. 181.21 through 181.25 and R.C. 181.27. The commission is Chaired by Chief Justice Sharon L. Kennedy of the Supreme Court of Ohio. The Commission currently has several active committees including the Adult Criminal Justice Committee, the Juvenile Justice Committee, and the Data Committee.
